

Educational Service Unit 11

ESU 11 is an intermediate agency providing supplementary educational services to K-12 school districts.

Staff Development

The Staff Development department works cooperatively with individual schools to initiate, plan, coordinate, and support staff development activities and programs.

Gifted Education

High Ability Learner Education (HAL) department works with member schools to provide for individual student needs and the development of extraordinary ability and potential. Services provided include consultant services, program development, and teacher in-service, both directly and indirectly through local and state workshops, programs, committees, and activities. The coordinator also identifies students and provides hands on student activities for individual schools. Unit wide opportunities such as Summer Honors, Quiz Bowls, Future Problem Solving, Invention Convention, Battle of the Books, Rural School House Enrichment, etc. are provided.

Technology

The Technology department works to ensure smooth operation of the wired and wireless network throughout the coverage area as well as other critical infrastructure services. Additionally, technology personnel consult with individual schools on projects and other technology initiatives, as well as Universal Service Fund filings.

Technology/Curriculum

This department works with member schools to assist with the utilization, proper use, and integration of technology into the schools and curricula, both on-site and indirectly through local, regional and state workshops, programs, and activities.

Media

The Media department provides an array of services to include an Audio/Video/DVD Library, video streaming, teacher work center (die cuts & Cricut machines), laminating, copy reproduction, large format printing, ID badge printing, booklet binding, satellite services, Video/CD/DVD duplication, and equipment loan services (Starlab, Data/Video Projectors, Astronomy Telescopes, RealCare babies, Student Response Systems, video conferencing devices and other associated equipment).

Special Education

Program Supervision

- Assistance with the completion of all special education reports including final financial reports, policies and procedures and the standards review process required by the Nebraska Department of Education.
- Access to professional staff development programs to update and train school district personnel on issues related to students with special needs.
- Administration of and support for ESU 11 special education professionals who deliver direct services to students and districts.
- Administration and support of the Early Childhood and Multi-Handicapped Program at New View School that provide direct services to students.

School Psychology

School Psychologists provide assessment and evaluation for students birth to age 21 who have been referred for special education. Consultation and inservice to school district personnel and parents is also an important role in the services to school districts.

Occupational Therapy

Occupational Therapists provide related services to children birth to age 21 who qualify according to the student's individual education plan. Support is also given to students, families and school personnel to enhance the child's education and foster independence.

Speech/Language Pathology

Speech Language Pathologists provide services to children who qualify for special services in the areas of speech communication, language, voice and fluency. Assessment and consultation services are additional services available.

Transition

Transition services and activities provide appropriate vocational assessments, job shadow and extended work experiences, student workshops, business and industry tours, parent workshops, staff development, and interagency collaboration and support.

Early Childhood Education

Early Childhood special educators, speech pathologists, occupational therapists, paraeducators, and service coordinators work together to address individual needs of children and provide comprehensive services to children birth to age 5 who qualify for special education.

Individualized Special Education Program

The New View School provides educational services to students with disabilities who benefit from individualized instructional programs. Speech, Occupational, Transition services, and Physical Therapy are offered according to the individual needs of the student.

The ESU 11 Board is comprised of ten representatives from an eleven county area, that are included in the 13 area school districts served by ESU 11. Each board member's term of office is four years and he/she serves without compensation.

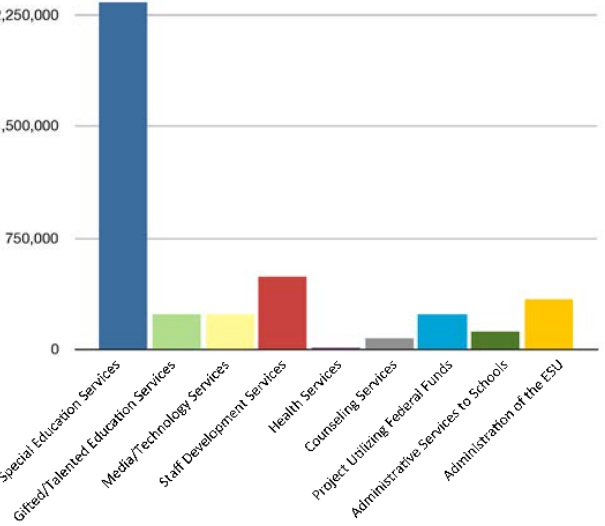

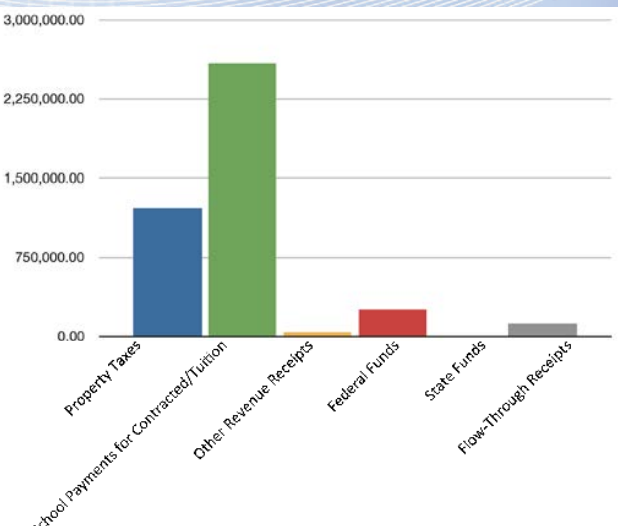

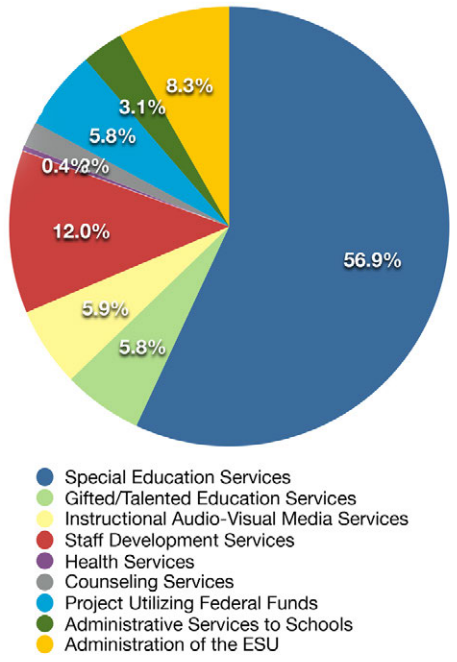
Revenue Received September 1, 2015 to August 31, 2016

The Program of Services provided by ESU 11 to its member school districts during the 2015-2016 school year was financially supported with revenue from various sources. The sources of revenue are listed below in the column on the left and the amounts received are listed in the column on the right.

Local Property Taxes: Revenue received from property taxes resulted from the ESU 11 General Fund property tax levy of 0.014999 on each \$100.00 of assessed valuation. The 2015-2016 assessed valuation for ESU 11 was \$8,504,957,072.00.
